



But, know that FS is not a repository for your hard copy. They would advise you to send your histories to DUP to be included in our joint effort. Do not send histories to FS that you have received from DUP and certainly **do not take credit for someone else's writing**. That is plagiarizing and is against the law. You may use histories from DUP or the internet as a resource for the information but you must write it in your **own** words to claim the story. FamilySearch will reference patrons to DUP for these histories and any further information we may have as we update our files. We do not accept histories sent to us that are directly from the internet. Be patient with this project. It is going to take some time to accomplish. It is bigger than FS first estimated. We will make you aware when it is ready to go public.

I have had quite a few fun remarks about my New Year's resolution and "Pickles." Marjorie Richard informed me that the author of "Pickles," Brian Crane, is an active member of the LDS church, lives in California, and if you watch closely he sometimes will put a picture of the Los Angeles temple on "pickles," wall. Camp and Company News

LINCOLN COUNTY AND UINTA WYOMING COMPANIES SUPPORT SMITHSONIAN PROJECT

For the past year (2014-2015) the Smithsonian Museum traveling exhibit "Museums on Main Street — Journey Stories" has been traveling through various places in Utah and Wyoming. The last exhibit will be at the Kemmerer Library, from May 1 to June 13. These DUP companies are supporting this exhibit and letting their local communities know what an asset DUP can be in preserving the history of their community.

The Lincoln County DUP met with the Star Valley Historical Society presidency and they are working toward a brochure showcasing the historical markers, museums and buildings from the top of the South End, Lander Trail Cut-off to the Astorian Monument in Alpine, including the Crow Creek Road markers, which was the original road (trail) into the Valley. This brochure will be a tri-fold with a map numbered with these places and a legend naming them. On the reverse side will be pictures showing some of the places. Brochures will be available at the Chamber of Commerce buildings in Thayne, and Alpine and other places. They also will have a display at the Kemmerer Library that tells the email addresses of the Historical Society and the Daughters of Utah Pioneers websites, and they will take the brochures, business cards, and a poster board map for their display.

The Uinta Wyoming DUP Company will be partnering with the Uinta County Museum with poster displays. There will be a total of ten posters displayed, two at a time, over the time period at the Uinta County Museum in Evanston. The posters cover prominent events of immigration to the Utah Territory.

MILES GOODYEAR CAMP ACTIVITIES






Pioneer Mysteries

MYSTERY SOLVED! ELIZA ROSETTA KING BLACK

Our Mystery Photo was identified by Brenda Wadley, Manila Camp, Utah Timpanogos Valley Company.

The unidentified woman in the picture is Eliza Rosetta King Black Lythgoe (known to the family as Ettie). She was born 3 October 1875 in Fillmore, Millard, Utah, and is the daughter of Volney LeRoy King, and Eliza Rosetta Syrett. Eliza, with her parents, moved to Circle Valley and was part of the initial group to join the Kingston United Order. Eliza married John Franklin Black and lived in Antimony, Utah. They eventually settled in Cowley, Wyoming where Eliza became the schoolteacher. She passed away in Lovell, Wyoming in 1955.

WORKSHOPS FOR MUSEUMS

“If you are like me, you found yourself working in your DUP museum without any ‘museum training.’ All I really new about DUP museums in general was that they contained ‘treasured artifacts from the past’ and that we should take care of them,” said one of the participants at the recent Utah Humanities workshop titled “Museum Collections and Stewardship.”

The two day “Collections Stewardship” workshop offered by Utah Humanities under the direction of Megan Van Frank, was held in Salt Lake City and then again in Castle Dale in March.

Jennifer Ortiz, Museum Specialist, with Utah Arts and Museums, announced two new workshops that are currently scheduled.

- **June 8-9** “Legal Issues for Small Museums” at the Rio Grande Building in downtown Salt Lake City. This course covers many legal issues facing museums such as registration documentation, dealing with donors and state, national and international laws that affect governance of museums. A select amount of scholarships are available to cover travel from 100 miles or more from Salt Lake City. Sponsored by the Utah Humanities and Utah Arts and Museums.
- **June 3rd week** (date to be determined) Museum of Peoples and Cultures in Provo. “Hand on Collections and Exhibitions Workshop.” Sponsored by Utah Humanities and the Registrar’s Committee for the Western Region.

MARKER #249 RELOCATED

Marker #249, **Provo's First Tabernacle** monument has been relocated. In a cooperative effort between the ISDUP, Provo Company DUP, Provo City Parks and Recreation and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints Historic Department, the large stone monument (previously on the Provo Tabernacle grounds, now known as the Provo City Center Temple Grounds) has been moved to a new home near the front entrance of the Provo Company DUP Pioneer Museum on 600 North and 500 West. Parks and Recreation employees cemeted and sodded the area. Provo DUP invites you to visit their Museum and see the relocated monument.

MARKER #92 REDEDICATED

A ceremony was held April 11, 2015 at 135 S Street in Salt Lake City. **Marker #92**, commemorating Brigham's Garden Wall was rededicated. The wall was built in 1850 and was eight feet high and 30 inches thick and made of cobblestone with a lime and sand mortar. The wall extended from Eagle Gate east to what is now called A Street, north to 4th Avenue, west to and along the property line of Canyon Road to State Street and Eagle Gate, enclosing orchard and garden, ice house, barn and private schoolhouse. The wall was first built to provide privacy and security for the homestead of the Church leader.
