Opal Chugg

Opal Martha Sorensen Chugg's father entered the Salt Lake Valley in 1866. Ole Julius Sorensen was 12 years old when he, his mother and brother arrived in the Peter Nebecker Company. He married Caroline Christensen; together they had seven children, Opal being the last-born.

She was born September 27, 1914 and raised in Hyrum, Cache County, Utah. Opal married Marion

Chugg in 1939. They raised their three children, Julia Ann, Marion Brent, and Mary Jo, in Providence, Cache, Utah. Her husband, Marion, died in 1982 leaving Opal a widow for 35 years. Opal died at the age of 102-½ on March 9, 2017.

She loved and honored her pioneer ancestors. Opal joined the Elizabeth Mathews Camp, Cache Far South Company, Utah in 1953 and remained an active, dues-paying member for 63-½ years!

Every Daughter was Opal's friend. At camp meetings Opal arrived early to greet and socialize with everyone. She brought and shared gifts of friendship, humor, joy, beauty, compassion, gratitude, punctuality and service. Our heritage truly does bind us together.

Note: The Honor Roll is comprised of Daughters of a pioneer parent who was born in or came to Utah Territory before 10 May 1869.

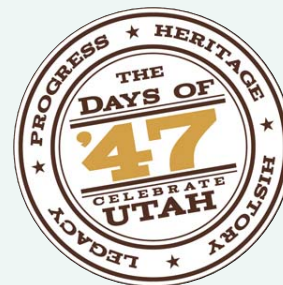
MORMON CREEK CAMP QUILT
